Professor Shepherd To Talk On Wendell Chino

Jeffrey P. Shepherd, UTEP Associate Professor of American Indian History will speak about Wendell Chino, President of the Mescalero Apaches for more than 30 years. The DACHS presentation will be November 15 at the Good Samaritan auditorium, 7 p.m.

According to the *New York Times*, "With Mr. Chino's guidance, the Mescalero Apache Nation built a ski resort, the Inn of the Mountain Gods, Casino Apache, a timber mill and a metal fabrication plant, as well as Indian schools, a hospital and a health center." Chino called it "Red Capitalism."

Chino was also noted for rejecting the State of New Mexico's authority over anything to do with the Mescalero and insisted on dealing with the U.S. government directly - nation to nation.

Jeffrey P. Shepherd is an Associate Professor of American Indian History, and the present Director of the Ph.D. Program. He has written several articles on Indigenous econom-

ics, education, politics, culture, and identity, such as "At the Crossroads of Hualapai History, Memory, and American Colonization: Contesting Space & Place," in the American Indian Quarterly. His book, We Are an Indian Nation: A History of the Hualapai People, was published in 2010 with the University of Arizona Press. For this research, he has received grants from the American Philosophical Society, the Max Millett Foundation for Graduate Research, the Ft. McDowell Indian Nation, the Andrew H. Mellon Foundation, Texas Tech University, and Brigham Young University. He is presently working on several projects: an environmental history of the Guadalupe Mountains and National Park in the Texas-New Mexico Borderlands; a history of the Nde' / Apache peoples and treaty-making; and a history of the Blackfoot peoples along the U.S. - Canada border. He serves as coeditor of the series, Critical Issues in Indigenous Studies, with the University of Arizona Press. Shepherd teaches graduate and undergraduate courses on Indigenous, Western, Public, and Borderlands History.

HSR Continues Lecture Series

Human Systems Research continues its series of lectures on the results of the Cañada Alamosa Project on Saturday, Nov. 3, at 7 p.m. in the Good Samaritan Auditorium. Doctor Judy Berryman will give a talk on "Time, Place, and Function: Ground Stone Recovered from the Cañada Alamosa Project." The ground stone assemblage is quite varied and provides insights into specific activities such as material reuse, food production, pigment processing, manufacture of other stone tools, bone working, pottery-making, and ritual.

JPL's WAC Corporal - First Rocket Fired At White Sands



This undated photo by James Flanagan shows engineers from the Jet Propulsion Laboratory loading their WAC Corporal rocket into its launch tower at the missile range's original launch complex. WAC Corporals were the first vehicles fired at White Sands - months before any German V-2 rockets. The first flight of a fully fueled WAC Corporal with its Tiny Tim booster was on Oct. 11, 1945. Prior to that shot, many test flights were conducted using just the booster and some combination of partially fueled WAC Corporals. In this photo, the Tiny Tim is on the trailer to the right of the rocket. The WAC Corporals were designed to carry a 25-pound package of meteorological instruments to an altitude of 20 miles.
